Our exciting topic is history based as we explore and learn about the events of the great fire of London. We shall be using lots of computer programmes to explore this exciting topic and lots of non-fiction books will be used as aids as we develop ourselves as historians to discover more facts surrounding this event. The children will learn more about the famous individual Samuel Pepys and we will be linking history with cross curricular areas such as Art where the children will learn about hot and cold colours and create portraits of Samuel Pepys. Within our London's Burning topic we shall also learn about Guy Fawkes and the gun powder plot once we have returned to start term 2. The children will use art, poetry and drama to bring this historical event to life. In D.T the children will design and make their own houses to recreate a street from the time of the Great Fire. P.E will also link with dance where the children will learn to represent the flames and fire through their movements. Geography will link to London, where the children will learn about the human and physical geography of our Capital city and understand the changes through time, from the Great fire of London until present day. R.E will focus on giving thanks in preparation for the Harvest festival. We will also look at how different religions give thanks. In computing, we will be developing word processing skills to support the wider topic learning and extending our understanding of how to navigate simple programmes to learn more about our history topic. Music will allow the children to explore different sounds that can be made by their bodies and they will be learning songs to link with the Great fire of London, Harvest and of course the Christmas nativity! Our novel study for this topic will be 'The Royal Rabbits of London' this will link closely to our history and geography learning for this term.
