Most of our students are engaged with technology in a wide variety of ways; as well as using the internet for education, they also play games, socialise and invest a lot of their personality in the social and ever-changing place that is online. But as well as enormous opportunities there are risks too which we have begun to communicate with you via these newsletters.

In school we do a lot to educate the children, but as the parent or carer you play the most important part. How you choose to model your online behaviours as well as how you monitor your child's devices etc are important to how children choose to behave online.

We are delighted that we have been able to secure Alan Mackenzie, an E-Safety expert who has been working with hundreds of schools, charities and other organisations for many years to come into school and deliver a workshop exclusively for our parents on how you can be supported.

A regular guest speaker at conferences he is an associate member of the UK Council for Child Internet Safety and Ambassador for the Child Exploitation and Online Protection Centre.

He specialises in internet safety and will be able to answer all your questions.

Unexplained Absences

We have reviewed our school procedure for children who have unexplained absences from school. There have been public cases **nationally** in the past where schools have not chased up the reasons as to why children are absent from school. It has then transpired that there have been tragic circumstances around these absences, e.g. illness of a parent and a child unable to seek help. With this in mind, having looked at every element of our current procedure, we will do everything we can to prevent such situations occurring as we are sure you would agree that your child's safety is paramount to us all. If your child is not going to be in school please call the office on 01400 230871 or email the school on enquiries@ancaster.lincs.sch.uk to report their absence. Please do this before 9:00am on the first day of the absence. If we have not heard from you by 9:15am then we will start to call **all the contact** numbers that you have provided (please ensure these are up to date) in order to gain an explanation for the absence. If we still have not been able to ascertain where your child is then we will make a

This procedure is to ensure that we know where your child is and that you are all safe. Please let us know in good time why your child is absent from school.
